## Mayor's Message

Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow on February 2<sup>nd</sup> predicting 6 more weeks of wintery weather then "After winter, you're looking forward to one of the most beautiful and brightest springs you've ever seen." Our crew is doing a great job maintaining snow removal, they very much appreciate and deserve the compliments called in for the work they do.

Thank you for the great response to the "chicken" survey, the attendance at the information meeting, and the numerous emails and calls I received on the topic of the keeping of chickens in the village. Your input is valued and will inform the board's decision whether to move forward with a proposed local law. Whatever the outcome, community involvement in the process makes community.

The three Village budgets, general, sewer, and electric for 2021-2022 are coming together and will be presented to residents before adoption by the board. We are working hard to compensate for the projected loss of revenue due to the consequences of the COVID 19 pandemic. At our weekly staff meetings, staff input has informed a schedule of road repair for spring which was postponed from 2020.

I am continuing to work with FEMA on the reimbursement for COVID expenditures, companies looking for acreage for a small solar project (a source of revenue to the village), and developers interested in our community. I am also working on a grant application (100% reimbursement) to fund the preservation of the exterior bricks on the Tulley building. The bricks are "Bergen Bricks", produced in the late 1800's in the village, soft bricks, which are deteriorating and in need of repair.

Look for a draft of the updated Village Zoning Law over the next few weeks; the committee has been dedicated, committed to making sure it is a workable document which reflects the Comprehensive Plan and what is in the best interest of our community. Working with the group has been a rewarding experience.

Gypsy moths have been spotted in the village; this moth is a significant pest because the caterpillars have voracious appetites for more than 300 species of trees and shrubs, posing a danger to North Ameri-

ca's forests. The caterpillars defoliate trees, leaving trees vulnerable to diseases and other pests and can eventually kill the tree. Please email us if you observe these moths so we can submit a report to the DEC.
