From the Desk of the Village Historian, Vicky Truax



It seemed fitting to write a story on the blizzard of '66. Fifty-seven years ago in January, Bergen got slammed with snow. The snow came so fast that traffic couldn't move. Many vehicles were stranded on 490. Barb Sackett Bates tells of her dad, "Skip Sackett," that ran the gas station where H & K is now. State police met Skip on 490 to check on stranded cars. In one of those cars was a man that had died. The police asked Skip to transport the body to a funeral home in Leroy. Skip replied that he could not do that. The solution was that the dead man's body would be stored at the gas station. It certainly was cold enough to preserve the body. As the story goes, there were at least three bodies stored there on the floor. Skip picked up the

priest at the Catholic Church in Bergen, (Patrick J. O' Donovan) and read the men their last rites.

Two Greyhound or Trailways buses, along with several cars were stranded at the four corners here in the village. These people went to the firehall (now the library) where it was warm. Word spread through the village and people were sent to area families, willing to house the "out of town" guests. Robin Charcolla remembers his family taking in 24 people. They lived directly across the street from the firehall, so it was within close vicinity. My family took in 7 cold and hungry travelers. Many snow forts were made with our new friends. I can remember firemen or some volunteers coming to our home asking if we needed any-thing such as milk. It was so wonderful that everyone came together and helped one another.
